Why Serve?

Sometimes we may wonder, "why serve?" Whose responsibility is it to serve people that are in need? As Christians, we have a clear command from Jesus, in Mark 12:30-31, when he tells us:

"This is the most important: ...you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second command is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' No other commandment is greater than these."

And in case we wonder who our neighbor may be, Jesus has an answer for that, too. In Luke 10:30-37 he tells us the story of the Good Samaritan, and we learn that "our neighbor" may be a person...

- ...in need
- ...who could not help him/herself
- ...of a different ethnicity
- ...of a different religion
- ...who had nothing to offer in return
- ...who required a risk*

Think about how you are called to serve your neighbors!

A Faith at Home Activity: Creating a Love-Your-Neighbor Jar

Use this activity from Vibrant Faith at Home to help your family keep serving others as a regular habit.

- 1. Say this prayer aloud:
- God, we know there are people who need our help. Help us to be good neighbors, and to show your love to others. Amen.
- 2. Read aloud from Mark 12:28-31 about the Great Commandment. What does Jesus mean by 'love your neighbor as yourself'? In what ways might our family do this?
- 3. Find a jar or container and label it "Love Your Neighbor." Decorate it!
- 4. On small pieces of paper, write out the following activities:

Gather loose change from around the house and use it to buy food for a local food pantry.

Choose some gently used clothes and/or toys to bring to the Thrift Shop.

Check your church bulletin for a list of people in need of prayer. Take time to pray for each one.

Put on work gloves. Walk around the neighborhood and pick up any trash you see.

As a family, offer to help a neighbor with some yardwork. Or, sweep a neighbor's sidewalk!

Telephone an older family member or neighbor to visit and share news.

Pick flowers or vegetables from your garden and take them to a neighbor. Or, draw a picture!

List your own idea here!

5. Choose a day each week to draw a slip and work together as a family to do the act of love described on it. Modify as needed to fit your family or your community. After you draw the paper, say this prayer:

Dear God, may our words and deeds help someone today. Amen.

Involving Children in Mission

When we involve young people in mission (serving others), we help nurture them into discipleship by teaching them to care for others and by providing them with opportunities to serve. Congregations often find ways to do this with older youth, but how about our youngest brothers and sisters in Christ? What are we doing to further their heart for service to others?

There are (at least!) six good reasons to involve children in mission:

- 1. To affirm them as valuable children of God
- 2. To demonstrate that they are the church of today as well as tomorrow
- 3. To encourage their spiritual development as disciples of Jesus Christ
- 4. To ingrain discipleship as a response to God's love for all people
- To teach social and moral responsibility for others
- 6. Because they are capable and want to help
