WEEK ONE: What is stewardship?

SCRIPTURE

The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it;

Psalm 24:1

For deeper reflection: Colossians 1:15-20

- Think about what "stewardship" means to you. How does it differ from "gratitude," or "generosity," two other words we use in this season?
- Identify the people and things for which you are a steward in your life. In other words, what do you take care of? And why?
- Consider setting aside a "giving jar" or other means of saving. Have everyone contribute—pennies add up to dollars! Discuss how you will spend this money as stewards.
- After reflecting on this topic, how do you feel called to act? What do you feel called to learn more about? How can St. Peter's help you grow as a steward?

WEEK TWO: Stewardship of Creation

- Have you ever been tempted to try to travel the path of faith alone? If so, what caused those feelings?
 Consider making a list, with other members of your household, of all the ways church community has helped or could help you to grow closer to God.
- After reflecting on this topic, how do you feel called to act? What do you feel called to learn more about? How can St. Peter's help you grow as a steward of our community?

For deeper reflection: Luke 10:38-41

- Martin Luther wrote: "This life, therefore, is not godliness but the process of becoming godly, not health but getting well, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not now what we shall be, but we are on the way. The process is not yet finished, but it is actively going on. This is not the goal but it is the right road. At present, everything does not gleam and sparkle, but everything is being cleansed." How does this reflection speak to you today?
- What does good health look like to you? How do you honor your creation in God's image by tending to your health?
- When we consider the health of our minds, bodies, and souls as a way to be a good steward of the blessings that God has given us, it can be easier to work towards the goal of maintaining our health.

SCRIPTURE

For deeper reflection: Luke 12:22-34

- List ways that wealth can work against living a life of faith, both inwardly and outwardly. Choose one problem in this area of your life, for example, trusting in money more than God for security. Hold it before God and quietly give it to God in prayer.
- How is your family using its money to love God and our neighbor? How is St. Peter's using its money to love God and our neighbor?
- After reflecting on this topic, how do you feel called to act? What do you feel called to learn more about? How can St. Peter's help you grow as a steward of your finances?

WEEK SIX: Stewardship of Vocation

REFLECTION

Vocation is not a goal to be achieved but a gift to be received. Every life experience becomes a vehicle for God's call to be realized in vocation. In learning our limits and embracing failures, we can begin to recognize God's particular gifts for us, which infuse our very being and form in us our unique vocation.
